In 1990 I discovered the Central Fraser Valley Fiddlers and became an active member. A friend gave me an old fiddle and Len Greer made it playable, so I decided I'd better learn to play! Shamma, and later Anna Sabir were my first teachers as I didn't have a clue how to play something without frets. My big moment in contests was when I tied with the previous Provincial Seniors Champion for 2nd place at Quesnel! I got the Bronze when Dan played a better jig!

Anyone can tell you that I travel around with all kinds of instruments from bass guitar, banjo, accordion, fiddle, and even my Dobro, a steel guitar. One of my roles with Branch #4 is being their official MC. I have enjoyed being MC for nearly twenty years at CFVF Contests, Jamborees, Fiddle Camps, Fiddlerama concerts, and at all the playouts I can be at. I

introduce the group, & tell a few jokes now and then to get a laugh out of the audience. I especially like the seniors' homes we play at.

Most recently, I recorded my first CD including some of the songs I've written over the last couple of decades including tunes which were performed with "The Ukrainian Prairie Band" like "The Cousin's Waltz". We are looking forward to performing for our fifth year at Seattle's Northwest Folk life Festival in 2012. It's been thrilling as well to have some of my fiddle tunes included in the CFV Fiddlers' latest CD as well as in the McGregor Family's second CD. Presently, I'm working on my second CD of original songs and look forward to playing tunes for a long time yet with the Central Fraser Valley Fiddlers, The Prairie Ukrainian Band and the Cheam Mountain Boys.

I should say that I do have many other interests including our family and our eight wonderful grandchildren. Joyce and I love cooking, gardening and we travel the world as much as we can. I must say that Joyce is not only the best (and lowest paid) "roady", but she's the best dancer I have ever met!

I now turn to my good and long-time friend Donna Randall. Donna grew up around music

with her family, learning to play the piano and a little guitar. When her Uncles Bert and Sandy Saundry would come to the house, her mother would learn to cord on the piano with them and Donna would sit and listen for hours.



I first met Donna when she and her fiddling son Alex became members of the CFVF many years ago. Prior to joining the BC Old Time Fiddlers, Donna and her son were a strong part of the Langley Music School's Western Fiddlers. When she realized that Alex needed further teaching in Old Time Fiddle, she turned to the Central Fraser Valley Fiddlers, with the help of her uncle Bert Saundry. There is where both Donna and Alex thrived. Later she learned to play the fiddle with the help of Keith Wilson and her son Alex.

When Dale McGregor and I established the Pacific Fiddle College in 2000, Donna soon became an invaluable aide. After I did two years as co-ordinator, Donna took it over and did an excellent job. Donna single-handedly organized the whole camp, worked furiously to make each one successful, and went the extra mile to make sure everyone was happy with the event. Donna knows just about everyone in the fiddle world and is well liked everywhere. Her son, Alex progressed from beginner to lead fiddler and then Instructor at the Pacific Fiddle College. I still remember him on stage with our grandson Gavin at his performance debut. On his knees, Alex was about the same height as Gavin! (for those who know Donna's son Alex, he joined the club when he was 12 and over the years he has reached the height of 6'7"!)

Donna, for several years, also organized the CFVF annual fiddle contest, not at all an easy job, along with the Jamboree, Pacific Fiddle College, Fiddlerama. She always did an excellent job and put in 150% effort all the way. She was on the BCOTFA Provincial Executive and on the Executive of Branch #4 for many years.

Hockey Moms have a reputation for hard work, sacrifice and dedication but I don't think they can come close to Fiddle Moms! Donna has stood by and supported her son Alex through thick and thin, taking him all over the country to play his fiddle.

Keith Wilson commented that both he & Alice have known Donna since they joined the CFV Fiddlers in the early 1990's. Keith worked with her on many of our fiddle contests, where she looked after the demanding job of tabulating all the contestants' marks and positions for the day. In addition, she annually looked after ordering and maintaining the many trophies that were handed out each year. Also, for a number of years, Donna was a tireless worker arranging the many details involved in putting on our annual Fiddle Camp at Hope.

Her love of fiddle music, and her family are very obvious. She continually promotes them in their journey to succeed.


I am sorry to announce that Merritt has canceled its Christmas Party.

As a club we were also able to play for a good portion of the evening dance, and were glad to have some of the Courtenay members join us for part of the time. Several people took advantage of the dry camping available to stay overnight and relax or jam, as the mood dictated.

Of course the highlight of the Jamboree was the visit and performance of Sarah Tradewell. What an incredibly talented and personable young woman. She gave a wonderful performance even though she had to be prepared

to run back to Victoria for another show that evening.

It was also very nice for me to meet Florence Tellier for the first time, even though it was a very brief encounter. When your only communication has been via email, your imagination creates its own image, so it was good to meet the real person. It was super that she and her husband had been able to travel to the Island for this event

We were part of the entertainment for the Sunshine Club Oktoberfest Tea, and that went very well, even though we had to rush off to play at Heritage Place that same afternoon. We also provided the music later that week for the Sunshine Club Dance. We generally play for at least three of their dances during the year. We also did a Halloween special for Abbeyfield with many of our members in some sort of costume.

We've had a few more guitar players join the ranks this year(for a while we kept losing them to the fiddle section) and I see and hear diligently them working learning the many chord progressions needed for the huge list of new-to-them pieces. With so many seniors in the club, we have found that it is very helpful to have a good number of musicians available for our various play-outs. With people often traveling or having other commitments, it is nice for the club to feel we can rely on having a firm core of fiddle players and sufficient back-up support, whether it is guitar, piano or bass, at any time. Piano players are like gold, so we're lucky to have two of them, and we now have a couple of people who can, when needed, switch from their primary role, and play electric bass to fill in if the "Tub " player is away or needs a rest (it is actually

quite hard to play that tub constantly for hours)

One issue that we are consciously working on right now, is the arrangement of musicians for playout or performance, to provide the best possible set-up to hear each other and give optimum sound. We have tended to get ourselves strung out in a line on the stage and have sometimes ended up with two separate sections, with the beat on one side milli-seconds behind the other. Not good. thinking that one of the keys is to get the back-up section well placed to start with. The "Tub" player said he was finding that he was forming a low-frequency sound wall between adjacent players and it was better if he was placed behind the group, rather than in front as a "novelty". We fiddlers need to learn to form a tighter block so everyone can hear well and therefore follow the lead fiddlers, who in turn need to hear a strong back-up. Are we tied up in knots yet? Do other clubs have similar problems? If so, have any interesting and creative solutions come up? All suggestions appreciated else what is an association for? Bit by bit, we learn and have fun and satisfaction doing so.

I guess Christmas and New Year celebrations are the next major events coming up, bringing with them the question "to play, or not to play", seasonal pieces. Always a tricky one, as some people like them and some don't. Nevertheless, we wish all of you a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year whatever music you are playing.


