


In the early 1990's Ada Brown and her team took on the project of compiling some musical information for every musician in the British Columbia Old Time Fiddlers' Association. I'd be willing to guess that if Ada had known

what she was getting in to that she would have had second thoughts. I wasn't a member at that time and so I don't have any direct memories of that project. I do know from talking to Ada that the project involved a lot of cutting and pasting – not the kind we do now on computers but rather the kind that involved physically cutting pieces of paper or photos and then pasting them on blank sheets of paper. I can only imagine the patience and frustration of doing a book in this way.

In this edition of the Red Book the "full force" of computer technology was brought into play. The submissions were received in all sorts of formats, fonts and styles – the computer program iBooks Author was able to take this information and size all the photos, change the fonts to a

standard one and then apply a style that is consistent throughout the publication. Page layout programs such as the one used here is able to allow inserts and then have everything that follows simply flow along and make space for the insert.

Putting together something like the Red Book is a huge task that was undertaken by many people. Having said that, the biggest job was to accumulate all the contributions from the 13 active branches throughout the province.

I know that there were all sorts of people behind the scenes that I probably don't know about and I really don't want to ignore their efforts, however there are some people that I especially want recognize. My job was perhaps the easiest of all as I simply compiled the information submitted into a unified format that would be able to be published.

Submissions have been received from all 13 Branches; 319 active musical members have taken the time to provide what I would call a short "Musical Bio". The total membership of the BCOTFA is over 600 and that includes everyone from "friends" of fiddle music to veteran players that have been with the fiddlers since the association first began. This edition of the Red Book contains write ups for 319 musicians that are currently playing and even includes some memorials for past players that have meant so much to the BCOTFA.

The objective from the start was to produce an updated Red Book in such a form that the most people possible would be able to have their own copy of the finished product. This is still the objective and the reality is getting closer and closer.

At this point each branch has received a draft copy of the book. I will wait for each branch to read over their

particular chapter and get the revisions/corrections back to me. I am not the best proof reader as I find it really difficult to read and re-read something – I do a lot better on the overall appearance – and so I'm relying on each branch to proofread their particular chapter. Although I think I have received all the submissions that I'm going to get, I could still insert someone if they have been somehow overlooked.

Where does it go from here? I'll need to allow about a month for the various Branches to have a look at the draft, & get any changes back to me. From there it's off to the printer, hopefully in time for Christmas presents.

Merritt Old Time Fiddlers had a very successful campout at Harmon Lake on


