As a result of this environment, I learned numerous Scottish melodies and dance patterns. At the age of ten I learned how to chord on the piano, so I was involved in chording for numerous fiddlers before I got command of the violin. Over the years, I learned to play dance music of that era. During my life, I played for Highland dancers, social parties, public dances and care homes. In 1968, I also formed a music band in Winnipeg, called the Rainbow Band, where we played for Ukrainian

Weddings and legion functions until 1970. In later years, I have competed in fiddle contests, which was very enjoyable. The main benefit of playing fiddle and saxophone in my later years, has brought me in

contact with a lot of wonderful people. I have the good fortune of having an eight year old great grandson who is learning to play the violin. He has an excellent conscience of perfect tone and amazing ability to memorize tunes. He is presently taking lessons once a week over the internet, from an Edmonton symphony violinist, so here's hoping that he will hang in there, to carry on. He presently lives in in 100 mile house, which is fiddle country.

I have been blessed to have four daughters, Linda Sobry, presently residing in Canosie Lake in Saskatchewan, Lorraine McDougall from Edmonton, Cynthia Prescott, from North Vancouver and Sharon Vance from 100 Mile House in British Columbia. I also have Grandaughters, and Great Grand Children.

Robert was a carpenter by trade and when he moved from Pierson Manitoba to British Columbia he settled in the Vancouver area, where he worked for the Vancouver International Airport and held the position as supervisor, in charge of Building maintenance, which included the

supervision of carpenters, painters and contractors. Robert retired in 1987 at the age of sixty where he could now enjoy the leisurely life of retirement.

Robert moved to the Abbotsford area after retirement and because of his passion for playing old time fiddle music, he joined the Central Fraser Valley Fiddlers in 1988 and became a member for a period of three years and later relocated to the White Rock and Surrey area. In 2003 he became a member of the Surrey Branch #5 Fiddlers, where he is still a member at the present time. During his involvement with the Surrey Fiddlers, Robert held the position of Vice President for a period of eight years. Robert still attends our monthly dances and sits in with the band every once in a while and also entertains our dance patrons with a couple of jokes and short stories.

In 2008, Robert formed a dance band called the Rhythmaires, which included Robert playing Violin and Alto Saxophone, Ester Schroder on Piano and Dennis Schroder on Bass Guitar. This band played every Friday evening at the O.A. Pensioner's hall in Abbotsford and the music they played brought in a lot of dancers, with attendance up to a hundred people at times. Unfortunately this band played for only two vears due to illness with one of the band members

Robert also played for the Haney Old Time Fiddler's dances, filling in for Len Greer, who was the lead fiddler of the band. Robert also played for some of the Old Time dances held at the O.A. Pensioner's hall in Aldergrove, B.C., with Audry Wood on Piano and Robert Hayek on Guitar.

Robert has always been a very friendly and likeable person who is well respected by all of the players and dancers who attend our Surrey Fiddlers dances and all of the Old Time Fiddler's dances held in Aldergrove. We hope that Robert continues to come out to our dances for many more years and entertain our dancers with his jokes and short stories.

It is great to have the online copy of the BC Provincal News letter go out to so many new people!!!


I would like to say thank you to all the branches that have been updating their pages for 2019 on http://bcfiddlers.com, have a look and see what is happening.

PRINCE GEORGE Branch #1






From homemade MINI FIDDLE cookies at each place setting to GIANT FIDDLES decorating the hall – we had both extremes at our 50th Anniversary


It's great to see all the younger people getting involved. Some have entertained


Our secretary Cress Farrow has put notices in the papers and several new members who have an interest in music have joined.



people that are trying to keep up with our monthly commitments.



Gordon Stobbie and JJ Guy will be in town on April 23 to entertain us (great musicians)


And give a Workshop later the same day on Harmony and Accompaniment, which sounds quite interesting.

kind heart and a love for dogs, was a carpenter and in his last years of his long life moved to Sayward and helped build them a house. We have missed these two and remember them fondly.



Another playout followed




Now into December, adding a few Christmas tunes to intersperse with our regular lists. This month we have decided to try adding a couple of evening practices to our schedule, hoping
